PROFESSIONAL DRIVER TRAINING UGANDA (PDTU) – MUKONO SCHOOL





The professional Driver Training School, located at Kigombya-Mukono is among the few driving schools in Uganda that offer Heavy Goods Vehicle (HVG) training in Uganda. Even more exciting is the fact that the services offered at the Safe Way Right Way school are considerably subsidised and free for the women. This (subsidisation) is mainly to promote affordable and quality training as a contribution to the creation of safer road for Africa. On the other hand, the free training (for the women) is a deliberate gesture by SWRW and her partners to bridge the gender gap that is apparent in the transport and Logistics sector in Uganda and Sub-Saharan Africa at large. Highlights

1. Breaking barriers: hitting milestones

We are happy to report that SWRW has in the year 2024 recorded a record number of female drivers totalling to 82 drivers. It should be recalled that the school also registered this year's pioneer lady bus drivers for training. The ladies, Ms. Ayikoru and Ms.Saidia Αli Jemmil, Susanne expressed their experience, both at the school for training and generally as pioneers in an otherwise male dominated sector., in an exclusive interview with our communications team.

SWRW retraced the driving history of the ladies amidst their training at the kigombya located school during an interview and reported it our 1st Quarter newsletter.

Ayikoru is a journalist by profession. She specifically pursued training in bus driving, notwithstanding that she had trained all other classes of HVGs. She was inspired by a female Nigerian bus driver. She believes that breaking the barriers in gendered sectors, like the transport sector, mainly relies on inspiration especially for the women.



She perceives her choice to pursue bus driving training as her contribution to the emancipation of women in Uganda and Africa at large. She said that:

"whereas history may not have been kind to the females, but there is possibility to bring down the societal barricades, and someone has to start that process."

Ms. Saidia's story although equally intriguing, was somewhat unique, especially as she managed to move through the ranks as a regular driver, to an ambulance driver, as a pioneer again.

Notably, 4 of our female driver graduates were offered jobs at Roofings Uganda Ltd and employers looking forward to taking more female drivers in in the first quarter.

Introduction

Safe Way Right Way through the VIA Schools project supported by TotalEnergies Uganda intervenes in schools in order to enforce a shift paradiam and behavioural change amongst the students so as a road safety culture. to nurture Through out the year 2024, we have conducted several interventions in these schools and have hit several milestones.

1. Road safety as a 2024 MDD theme.

The project team engaged the Ministry of Education and Sports in advocating for the adoption of road safety as a theme in the annual MDD activities and competitions. The Ministry adopted road safety as a sub-theme for a poem to be presented by the participating schools in the Annual competition in 2024.

2. Refreshing For The Better: Via Teachers

In January, 2024, SWRW conducted the training to refresh the material and knowledge of the teachers. They were guided on how best to guide their pupils on how to respond to the growing traffic volume and some of the negative reactions from community members. The training was conducted in the Albertine region for the 250 teachers previously trained as VIA educators. The teachers were given training materials, Traffic signs posters, and T- shirts after the training.













3. Via For The Environment: Tree Planting In Via Schools

SWRW pays extra attention to environmental conservation and is alive to the climate change risks, especially for the developing countries like Uganda. In 2024, SWRW launched the tree planting project at Kisansya Primary School where TotalEnergies EP officials and Key leaders in the Albertine region attended.

This reinforces the relevance that the eco system offers to road safety initiatives. At this instance, a total of 1920 tree seedlings were distributed to 9 schools in Kigwera sub-county, Ngwedo sub-county, and Wanseko Town council.

We are confident that this has contributed the more to maintenance of lively school This will further compounds. facilitate safety at the school by providing refresher premises zones and laying ground for the development of active 'talking compounds' as a safety intervention in these schools.

VIA AMBASSADORS PROJECT

As I stand before my students, I am reminded that educating them on road safety is not only a responsibility but a lifeline. Every day, thousands of lives are lost on African roads due to preventable accidents. With the support of Safe Way Right Way, me and my colleagues are changing this narrative, one school at a time.

Africa's roads are a ticking time bomb. The continent accounts for only 2% of the world's vehicles but a staggering 16% of global road fatalities. In many countries, road accidents are a leading cause of death among children and young adults. The numbers are daunting, but we are determined to reverse this trend.

Our approach is simple yet effective. Through our teaching duty at the several schools, our target is shaping the minds of future road users. Through interactive sessions and hands-on activities, learning is made fun and engaging. Several road safety clubs have been established in numerous schools, fostering a culture of safety among students, teachers, and parents.

At the heart of our education program are critical messages that can mean the difference between life and death. We emphasize the importance of helmet and seatbelt usage, pedestrian safety, driver education, and visibility and awareness to our pupils and students. These simple habits and practices can save countless lives.

Through tireless efforts. my have remarkable transformations witnessed first hand. Students have designed innovative road safety campaigns, schools have adopted road safety agendas, and communities have come together to engage in awareness events. But our work, as teachers, is far from over. We need your support to continue this critical mission. Together, we can make a difference. We can support road safety education in schools, advocate for infrastructure improvements, and encourage responsible road behaviour. Special appreciation is extended to Safe Way Right Way. I believe that every life saved is a testament to our collective

efforts.

On 18th July, 2024, the Director of Traffic and Road Safety in the Uganda Police Force, Mr. Nuwabiine Lawrence visited the Albertine district and was welcomed and hosted by SWRW at Ndandamire Primary school, with the support of Total Energies EP and the Tilenga project.

He expressed gratitude to SWRW, Total Energies EP and the Tilenga project for investing in the young generation of Boda Boda riders. He also commended Champion Trainer Mr. Mike. Bazale champion who a demonstrated the skills learnt, for his tireless efforts in promoting road safety good awareness, cleanliness, and behaviour among his peers.

To further support the riders, Lawrence distributed highway code books and road sign charts to the Wanseko stage riders, empowering them with knowledge to stay safe on the roads. The launch was attended by notable Traffic officials, including Police Spokesperson SP Michael Kananura, Regional and District Traffic Officers, Officer District Buliisa. 2. Trainer of Trainers: Revving Up Road Safety through peers

With the support of the SWRW Community Liaison Officers and the trained Boda Boda champions in the Albertine region, peer to peer training as a trailblazing activity is proof that collective action can drive meaningful change and save lives on our roads. Take for instance, that SWRW conducted over 588 training sessions and reached over 7,485 riders.

3. Road Safety messages and jingles

Throughout the year, SWRW strategically partnered with local radio stations to broadcast a series of targeted jingles at about six times a day, across several stations in the Albertine. We happily note that a total of 1,050 adverts were broadcast across various radio stations, including Spice FM, Biiso FM, Pakwach FM, and Nwoya FM. The adverts reached a broad audience, airing in five languages (English, Lugungu, Alur, Runyoro, and Acholi).

We reached drivers, riders, and communities in the Albertine region. By sharing vital safety information in local languages, SWRW mitigated the risks associated with increased traffic flow and ensure a safer journey for all.

To further amplify the reach during the festive period, 336 radio adverts were broadcast in December 2024, including 252 radio jingles and 84 DJ mentions tailored to the holiday season.

4. Billboards

More is usually not enough, and this is especially true for road safety. That is why at SWRW we are locked in a constant cycle of intervening in society so as to alleviate road safety risks until we record zero crashes.

strategically With that trail. SWRW placed freethree double-faced standing billboards along key roads in the Albertine Region during the festive season. The billboards were positioned Kampala-Hoima alona the Road. Hoima-Buliisa Road, and in Pakwach town, running for one months sensitise road users entering and exiting the abovementioned strategic districts and towns on the necessary road cautions.

We are excited to report that in those targeted areas, towns and/or cities, there were minimal road crashes in the festive season when compared to recent years. This activity was supported

by TotalEnergies EP and the Tilenga project.







5. Road Talk shows

SWRW appreciates the central role played by radio in the Albertine community and has in fact leveraged this to further the road safety gospel in that region. For instance, SWRW, with the support of TotalEnergies EP and the Tilenga project, conducted 20 radio talk shows across the project districts, featuring traffic police and representatives from key road user groups, such as Boda-Boda and Taxi drivers' chairpersons.

These talk shows were broadcast on popular local stations, including Pakwach FM, Voice of Nwoya, Spice FM, Biiso FM, and Radio Maria. The total reach of the talk shows is estimated between 800,000 to 1.3 million people, ensuring extensive exposure of road safety messages to a diverse audience across the region.

Our talk shows were aimed at proffering the necessary information to the society and were manned by officials from Uganda Police Force, Petroleum Authority Uganda (PAU), TotalEnergies and Key district stakeholders.

6. Building Capacity: Training Taxi Drivers in the Albertine Region

The Albertine region continues to grapple with increasing motorisation, mainly resulting from exploration activities. There is a need to balance economic development and community safety. To strike this delicate balance, SWRW identified the obstacle to general road safety as persistent reckless driver behaviour.

Accordingly, SWRW embarked on a mobilisation and sensitisation agenda of the most strategic drivers in the region – taxi drivers and boda boda riders.

Whereas the riders were, time and again, under the direct training and sensitisation of our Community Liason officers, there was a gap in so far as taxi drivers (also commonly referred to as wish drivers) were concerned.

This training aimed at equipping the driver with the necessary knowledge to enable them to efficiently comply with the traffic laws; in this respect, the drivers were facilitated by Mr.Brian Matsiko from Ministry of works and Transport (MoWT) in the sphere of license registration and renewal requirements. Mr.Kisaakye Robert, a senior licensing officer at MoWT also trained the commuter taxi drivers on the legal regime

governing their transport sector. refreshed them on the traffic laws, offences, penalties and any changes or amendments. As Icing on the cake, Safe Way Right Way's master instructor Mr.Bwire Silver equipped the drivers with the knowledge, skills and attitude to develop the necessary road discipline to maximise security on the road. On conclusion of the training, drivers were awarded with certificates upon completion of the training, these were awarded by the Traffic Officer Mr.Tumwebaze Regional Yoram.

7. First Responders' training

In order to respond to unavoidable road crashes in the Albertine Regin, SWRW in collaboration with TotalEnergies EP and the Tilenga project skilled 70 individuals as first responders. This training was conducted across the districts of Hoima, Kikuube, Pakwach, Nwoya, and Buliisa in order to build capacity by enhancing emergency response capabilities for quick and effective responses to crashes and save lives.

The training which was provided by The Association of Ambulance Professionals Uganda (AAPU), encompassed emergency medical services, and focused on equipping participants with essential first aid skills, such as crash scene assessment, basic life support techniques, and wound management.

The targeted participants included Bodaboda riders and LC1 chairpersons, who are often the first to arrive at crash scenes and through this training, we aimed to reduce casualties and improve survival rates in these crash-prone areas, ultimately strengthening the region's overall emergency response capacity.

The training included 20 participants from Hoima, 5 from Kikuube, 15 from Pakwach, 16 from Nwoya, and 14 from Buliisa.

8. Review Meetings: Calibrating progress.



We are alive to the invaluable support that our key stakeholders proffer to us and to the materialisation of our project.

In order to ensure accountability, SWRW conducted 03 project review meetings in three districts of Buliisa, Pakwach, and Hoima to update the stakeholders on the project achievements, challenges, and lessons learned as well as gather feedback regarding the Community Road Safety project implementation within the project districts.

In Buliisa, the meeting was held on the 18th of December and 35 stakeholders attended, Hoima on the 20th of December with 38 stakeholders, and in Pakwach on the 19th of December with 39 stakeholders.

SWRW received project evaluations comprising of criticisms and recommendations which the team is keen to pay extra attention to and ensure that in the next year of implementation, the same are applied, in order to ensure maximum project implementation and productivity.
